Following my time at the University of Calgary, I went on to the Southern Alberta Institute of Technology Completing my Power and Process Operations Certificate as well as my Instrumentation Engineering Technology Diploma. I had the opportunity to play for the SAIT Trojans while I was there getting an education and that is where my playing days ended.
